### 'Ohana Engagement at Ka 'Umeke Kā'eo

Three years ago, Ka 'Umeke Kā'eo was provided with funding via the Preschool Development Grant (PDG), to develop a comprehensive 'ohana engagement program. It was the first time in nearly a decade that the school was able to hire staff dedicated to 'ohana engagement and host regular programming and events. To date, we have provided quarterly 'Ohana Nights, monthly Pō Ho'onui 'Ike, 'Ōlelo Hawai'i courses, a kumu and classroom incentive program, and 'ohana huaka'i to multiple sites across Hawai'i Island. We have also put a concerted effort into data collection to help us better assess and measure the impact of 'ohana engagement on student learning.

According to research 'ohana engagement translates into: increased haumāna achievement in terms of test scores and GPA, more positive attitudes and behaviors, haumāna who are more likely to complete their school and homework, better daily attendance, better social skills, and increased likelihood to pursue a college education. We encourage all 'ohana to come and participate in our hosted activities, but there are lots of ways that you can support your keiki's educational experience. These include actively monitoring their completion of assignments, checking in with their kumu on their progress, ensuring they are in school regularly, and providing words of encouragement and advice.
