ONLY FOR HAUMĀNA WHO WILL BE IN KULA WAENA AND KULA KI'EKI'E NEXT SCHOOL YEAR Hui Hoʻoleimaluō and ʻĀina University, with support from Ka ʻUmeke Kāʻeo and funding from Kamehameha Schools, are offering haumana that will be in our Kula Waena and Kula Ki'eki'e next year the opportunity to be in their Mauka to Makai Stewardship and Sustainability Program. It will take place in Keaukaha and Pauka'a. This is an 'olelo Hawai'i program filled with hands-on engagement with the 'aina and elements. 'Ohana will be responsible for transportation to and from the sites. Masks will be required but may be removed during physical activity and swimming. Lei Kupukupu With Kumu 'Au'a

Join us for an opportunity you don't want to miss!

Kumu 'Au'a is offering a zoom workshop for our 'ohana to learn the art of creating lei kupukupu. Those huamāna who attend kula in person will be a part of this years hō'ike ceremony and will be wearing lei kupukupu. For us at home, we can wear our lei kupukupu while we watch our hō'ike. We will also be learning the proper way to dispose of our lei when we remove them.

For this workshop you will need 12 kupukupu. Gather your kupukupu by pinching it off the stem before the base. Kupukupu grow straight and have thicker, smaller, and darker green leaves than a common fern found here in the wild. Make sure you gather the correct fern.
