This chant was written as a component of protocols done at ka loko i'a 'o <u>Hale O Lono</u> in Honohononui, Hawai'i. The chant is to be delivered at the very end of the work day; accounting for the work completed and expressing an appreciation for a productive experience. This chant can be utilized at any loko i'a by substituting the name of the particular loko i'a with "Hale O Lono in the last line of the chant." This oli is chanted in the kawele style.

To replenish the fish that crawl as well as the fish that swim

The waters of Kane & Kanaloa are flowing freely

The prohibitions of our caretaker are to be obeyed
